In accordance with program guidance, EM sites will:

- Provide opportunity for stakeholders to provide input on the sites' prioritized activities for FY 2017.
- Incorporate stakeholders recommendations along with their own recommended course of action with the budget submittal to DOE Headquarters.



- PBS 11C Nuclear Materials Stabilization & Disposition
- PBS 12 Spent Nuclear Fuel Stabilization & Disposition
- PBS 13 Solid Waste Stabilization & Disposition
- PBS 14C Radioactive Liquid Tank Waste Stabilization & Disposition 2035
- PBS 20 Safeguards and Security
- PBS 30 Soil & Water Remediation
- PBS 100 Savannah River Community & Regulatory Support

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Safety and Security are the highest priorities when developing budgets followed by Regulatory Compliance.

Within that context, SRS's programmatic priorities generally are:

- Liquid Waste
- Nuclear Materials (H-Canyon, K-Area, L-Area)
- Solid Waste
- Soil & Water Remediation
- Deactivation & Decommissioning

Each of these programs are broken into parts that build up to an Integrated Priority List (IPL).

- This is a partial example of the way work scope is broken down on the IPL.
 - Liquid Waste Program (PBS 14C)
 - Maintain Liquid Waste Facilities in a Minimum Safe Operational State (\$xxx million)
 - Bulk Waste Removal from Tanks (\$xxx million)
 - Salt Waste Treatment and Disposal (\$xxx million)
 - Vitrified Waste Canister Production
 - Tank Closures
 - Salt Waste Processing Facility Construction
 - Salt Waste Processing Facility Tie-ins
 - Salt Waste Processing Facility Operations
 - Etc.....

Once we have the list of activities and estimated budget requirements for all of the PBS's, we sort, prioritize, and draw a line at our assigned budget target.

- With seven PBS's and five to ten work activities per PBS, SRS's IPL may contain 30 to 50 work activities.
- Funding requirements include both the direct cost to perform work and "indirect costs" such as pension and site overhead expenses.
- Many basic activities are considered mandatory security for example, such that we frequently must focus on increments of funding that have a significant impact on our ability to complete our missions.
- There is always more work to do so the site will identify the most important additional work that we would undertake as "over target".

Dear Dr. Moody:

The Savannah River Site Citizens Advisory Board appreciates the opportunity to provide input to the site's prioritized activities for FY 2016. As in the past, the high level liquid waste management program remains our highest priority. The budget request for FY 2016 should reflect this priority and should be at a level that guarantees compliance with all state and federal agreements so that all high level waste storage tanks are empty by 2028, per the Site Treatment Plan. Any funding short of this would be a great concern to us. Thus, as the budget is formulated, we will closely watch the level of funding for PBS-14C. Radioactive Liquid Tank Waste Stabilization and Disposition.

As for other Environmental Management mission activities, our second highest priority is PBS-11C, NM Stabilization and Disposition. This budget item includes several activities that we strongly support. We have ranked them in the following order:

- 1. Plutonium down-blend processing for disposition to the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant;
- 2. 235-F Risk Reduction Project; and
- 3. Used Nuclear Fuel down-blend processing for disposition to the Tennessee Valley Authority.

To reiterate, our highest budget priority for FY 2016 is PBS-14C, Radioactive Liquid Tank Waste Stabilization and Disposition, followed by PBS-11C, NM Stabilization and Disposition, with activities prioritized as shown directly above.

We hope that our input is taken seriously as the budget request for the Savannah River Site is formulated for FY 2016.
