- Assets for Services & Removal
- Separate NNSA Program for MOX Assets
- Real Estate License Agreements
 - Use designated Government- owned facilities at SRS
 - Grants permission to use designated structures, together with ingress and egress, for purposes of preparing and removing such real property structures, installed equipment and/or related personal property for transfer to SRSCRO as personal property

WORC Grant Program Results

May 2016 to June 2023

- 2,216 scholarships (on semester basis) awarded in 36 relevant education & training programs
- 738 students (approximately) have received scholarships ranging from \$500 to \$5,000 per student
- 75% of scholarships awarded to minority (40%) and non-traditional (35%) students
- 378+ students selected for internships at SRS from local college programs
- 225+ WORC program students hired in full-time positions at the Savannah River Site
